

Transmission hologram 20.3 x 25.4 cm Gamble pioneered the use of holography as fine art during a period of innovation and acceptance for the medium in the 1980s. To make these images, she playfully 'dressed' the hologram plates with lingerie. The laser used to expose the plates imprints a sharp shadow and spectral colours, while moiré patterns appear between the different layers.
